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Demographic Profile

The population in the Lower Savannah was 311,097 per American Community Survey data for 2018-2022.

The region has a civilian labor force of 140,600 with a participation rate of 56.0%. Of individuals 25 to 64 in the Lower Savannah, 25.6% have a bachelor's degree or higher which compares with 36.5% in the nation.

The median household income in the Lower Savannah is \$57,231 and the median house value is \$161,649.



Employment Trends

As of 2024Q4, total employment for the Lower Savannah was 119,742 (based on a four-quarter moving average). Over the year ending 2024Q4, employment increased 1.3% in the region.

Employment for Lower Savannah



Unemployment Rate

The unemployment rate for the Lower Savannah was 4.6% as of March 2025. The regional unemployment rate was higher than the national rate of 4.3%. One year earlier, in March 2024, the unemployment rate in the Lower Savannah was 4.3%.

Unemployment Rate for Lower Savannah



Wage Trends

The average worker in the Lower Savannah earned annual wages of \$56,955 as of 2024Q4. Average annual wages per worker increased 6.9% in the region over the preceding four quarters. For comparison purposes, annual average wages were \$73,145 in the nation as of 2024Q4.

Cost of Living Index

The Cost of Living Index estimates the relative price levels for consumer goods and services. When applied to wages and salaries, the result is a measure of relative purchasing power. The cost of living is 17.2% lower in Lower Savannah than the U.S. average.



Industry Snapshot

The largest sector in the Lower Savannah is Manufacturing, employing 17,255 workers. The next-largest sectors in the region are Health Care and Social Assistance (15,185 workers) and Retail Trade (13,362). High location quotients (LQs) indicate sectors in which a region has high concentrations of employment compared to the national average. The sectors with the largest LQs in the region are Manufacturing (LQ = 1.83), Administrative and Support and Waste Management and Remediation Services (1.72), and Agriculture, Forestry, Fishing and Hunting (1.69).

Sectors in the Lower Savannah with the highest average wages per worker are Utilities (\$99,936), Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services (\$91,236), and Manufacturing (\$84,356). Regional sectors with the best job growth (or most moderate job losses) over the last 5 years are Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services (+1,977 jobs), Health Care and Social Assistance (+1,232), and Construction (+436).

Over the next 1 year, employment in the Lower Savannah is projected to expand by 452 jobs. The fastest growing sector in the region is expected to be Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services with a +1.2% year-over-year rate of growth. The strongest forecast by number of jobs over this period is expected for Health Care and Social Assistance (+119 jobs), Administrative and Support and Waste Management and Remediation Services (+94), and Construction (+79).

Occupation Snapshot

The largest major occupation group in the Lower Savannah is Transportation and Material Moving Occupations, employing 13,539 workers. The next-largest occupation groups in the region are Office and Administrative Support Occupations (12,378 workers) and Production Occupations (11,643). High location quotients (LQs) indicate occupation groups in which a region has high concentrations of employment compared to the national average. The major groups with the largest LQs in the region are Production Occupations (LQ = 1.80), Transportation and Material Moving Occupations (1.31), and Construction and Extraction Occupations (1.29).

Occupation groups in the Lower Savannah with the highest average wages per worker are Management Occupations (\$110,200), Legal Occupations (\$103,700), and Architecture and Engineering Occupations (\$98,600). The unemployment rate in the region varied among the major groups from 1.6% among Legal Occupations to 10.5% among Farming, Fishing, and Forestry Occupations.

Over the next 1 year, the fastest growing occupation group in the Lower Savannah is expected to be Healthcare Support Occupations with a +1.3% year-over-year rate of growth. The strongest forecast by number of jobs over this period is expected for Healthcare Support Occupations (+66 jobs) and Transportation and Material Moving Occupations (+65). Over the same period, the highest separation demand (occupation demand due to retirements and workers moving from one occupation to another) is expected in Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations (1,947 jobs) and Transportation and Material Moving Occupations (1,671).



Wages by occupation are as of 2024 provided by the BLS and imputed where necessary. Forecast employment growth uses national projections from the Bureau of Labor Statistics adapted for regional growth patterns.

Industry Clusters

A cluster is a geographic concentration of interrelated industries or occupations. The industry cluster in the Lower Savannah with the highest relative concentration is Utilities with a location quotient of 12.02. This cluster employs 6,685 workers in the region with an average wage of \$147,346. Employment in the Utilities cluster is projected to expand in the region about 0.9% per year over the next ten years.

Industry Clusters for Lower Savannah as of 2024Q4



Education Levels

Expected growth rates for occupations vary by the education and training required. While all employment in the Lower Savannah is projected to grow 0.4% over the next ten years, occupations typically requiring a postgraduate degree are expected to grow 0.6% per year, those requiring a bachelor's degree are forecast to grow 0.7% per year, and occupations typically needing a 2-year degree or certificate are expected to grow 0.7% per year.

Annual Average Projected Job Growth by Education Levels



Gross Domestic Product

Gross Domestic Product (GDP) is the total value of goods and services produced by a region. In 2023, nominal GDP in the Lower Savannah expanded 7.9%. This follows growth of 7.0% in 2022. As of 2023, total GDP in the Lower Savannah was \$13,589,987,000.

Of the sectors in the Lower Savannah, Manufacturing contributed the largest portion of GDP in 2023, \$2,792,034,000. The next-largest contributions came from Administrative and Support and Waste Management and Remediation Services (\$1,676,351,000); Construction (\$1,214,298,000); and Health Care and Social Assistance (\$1,078,092,000).



FAQ

What is a location quotient?

A location quotient (LQ) is a measurement of concentration in comparison to the nation. An LQ of 1.00 indicates a region has the same concentration of an industry (or occupation) as the nation. An LQ of 2.00 would mean the region has twice the expected employment compared to the nation and an LQ of 0.50 would mean the region has half the expected employment in comparison to the nation.

What is separation demand?

Separation demand is the number of jobs required due to separations—labor force exits (including retirements) and turnover resulting from workers moving from one occupation into another. Note that separation demand does not include all turnover—it does not include when workers stay in the same occupation but switch employers. The total projected demand for an occupation is the sum of the separation demand and the growth demand (which is the increase or decrease of jobs in an occupation expected due to expansion or contraction of the overall number of jobs in that occupation).

What is a cluster?

A cluster is a geographic concentration of interrelated industries or occupations. If a regional cluster has a location quotient of 1.25 or greater, the region is considered to possess a competitive advantage in that cluster.

What is the difference between industry wages and occupation wages?

Industry wages and occupation wages are estimated via separate data sets, often the time periods being reported do not align, and wages are defined slightly differently in the two systems (for example, certain bonuses are included in the industry wages but not the occupation wages). It is therefore common that estimates of the average industry wages and average occupation wages in a region do not match exactly.

What is NAICS?

The North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) is used to classify business establishments according to the type of economic activity. The NAICS Code comprises six levels, from the “all industry” level to the 6-digit level. The first two digits define the top level category, known as the “sector,” which is the level examined in this report.

What is SOC?

The Standard Occupational Classification system (SOC) is used to classify workers into occupational categories. All workers are classified into one of over 804 occupations according to their occupational definition. To facilitate classification, occupations are combined to form 22 major groups, 95 minor groups, and 452 occupation groups. Each occupation group includes detailed occupations requiring similar job duties, skills, education, or experience.
